Doubles variations using Plain Bob, Reverse Canterbury Pleasure and Grandsire Singles

Rows of the left hand column are the base method, column header in red gives the bob (and single if there is one).

So, for example, Plain Bob, but with a Reverse Canterbury Bob for the Bob is called "Kennington"

and Reverse Canterbury, but with a Plain Bob Plain Lead for a Bob and a Grandsire Single for a Single is called "Monster's Pleasure"

A Plain Course of St Augustine is a Grandsire Single at every lead (and a Grandsire Start)

Callings: Calls made as the treble is in thirds coming into lead (like Grandsire Doubles), and with most variations you can't finish with a call.

So, for example, Southrepps has the observation bell as the bell making long 5ths but you can't call the 5th observation.
